Explore the Gallatin Valley's agricultural heritage in continuing art series

Mountain Time Arts' Gabriel Canal is the final installment of the four-part series, WaterWorks, that included Upstream and Spring Thirst in June, and Wetlands in

The event will again use public art to raise awareness about water, this time to celebrate agricultural stewardship in the Gallatin Valley.

Gabriel Canal is a performance event about water and irrigation, made with and about the Gallatin Valley's agricultural community. It will shed light on their current environmental perspectives and the function of the valley's canal and ditch system.

While walking through the historic Kelly Ranch, audience members will experience the remarkable engineering feat of the Low-Line Canal, witness a range of historic farming practices, hear original songs that speak about ranchers' ecological indicators, encounter a performance video and an animation about water rights. The event culminates at dusk in a large-scale performance of a late 19th century harvest scene and the illumination of the Gabriel Canal.

This collaborative project, directed by Mary Ellen Strom, features a sound score by Greg Young, music by the Bear Canyon Drummers, a video installation by Laine Rettmer, a light installation by Jim Madden, Travis Cook and Ken Dineen, costumes by Alayna Rasile, sculpture by Jim Zimpel,

custom made instruments by Joe Schwem and an installation by Isabel Beavers.

Space is limited. Anyone interested in attending the event must sign up on the MTA website: mountaintimearts.org. Events are free and open to all.

Performances will take place on three evenings, Aug. 23, Aug. 24 and Aug. 25. Note: You cannot drive directly to Gabriel Canal. Park at Zoot Enterprises, 555 Zoot Enterprises Lane, Bozeman, to board a shuttle bus for Gabriel Canal. Please arrive at Zoot by 7:15 p.m. Buses will depart at 7:30 p.m. and return to Zoot by 9:30 p.m.

Walking shoes are recommended. The hour-long project involves walking a half-mile. Additionally, there will be golf carts available for a seated experience.

WORDS OF THE WEEK: WING DING

Expressions such as wheelerdealer and super-duper belong to a class of words called reduplications, which consist of pairs of repeating or rhyming terms. We American English speakers love coining and using reduplications. Used skillfully, they are expressive and evocative.

Consider wing-ding, which today refers to a boisterous gathering, or elegant little social event. This reduplication showed up in the early 20th century as a narcotics term. In that world, a wing-ding was a drug addict's counterfeit seizure enacted to attract sympathy. Here's how the


language quarterly American Speech defined the expression in 1933:

"When an addict who...cannot obtain dope...becomes desperate, he may throw a wing-ding...in the hope that the doctor...will administer narcotics to quiet him. Professional wing-dingers are addicts who make a practice of obtaining in this manner"

The expression is probably a rhyme of the word *wing*, a playful slang reference to the human arm, so someone who stages a wing-ding is throwing the arms around in a simulated convulsion. By the 1940s,



a wing-ding was also a fit of anger or a loud emotional outburst, which is often accompanied by arm-waving. Today, a wing-ding might be a noisy, uninhibited party, or, in more refined circles, an elegant affair in a lavish setting.
